Engagement Ideas

Lunch and Learns

Host Lunch and Learns to spread the word! A good place to start is to explain
the current licensure process to first and second years to get them informed and
interested. From there go into the details of ASDA's ideal licensure exam.

Share information with your chapter

- Have an Instagram take-over during advocacy month to share information about licensure reform. This can include videos or graphics with fast facts to generate interest in this important topic.
- Send out licensure reform updates and fun facts to get people engaged
- Post information around the school on places like bulletin boards

Round table discussions

Organize round table discussions potentially with dinner or desserts to get people to think critically about the current licensure exam and ASDA's ideal licensure exam. Start the event with a brief presentation about licensure reform then have people break into small groups to discuss specific questions. At the end, have everyone come back and share answers as a group.

Panels with 4th year students

O Host a panel of students who recently took boards to explain the process and their experiences with people in other classes. This is will allow people to understand what the current licensure process consists of earlier on in their dental school career and hopefully inspire them to initiate change.

Start a Licensure Reform Task Force

O Gather a group of students from all classes who are dedicated and interested in advocacy to spark change in your state by speaking with faculty at your school, your state dental association, and your state board of dental examiners.
